Child Friendly Child on Child Abuse Policy

What is Child on Child Abuse?

Child on Child abuse is when one child causes harm to another child.

The abuse or harm can be in different forms, such as:

- Verbal - such as saying unkind things, name calling, making threats,
- Physical - such as pushing, hitting, kicking,
- Online—this could be sending text messages or messages via phone apps/ on tablets or using online gaming

Child on Child abuse includes bullying.



If a child is intentionally causing upset, harm or scaring another child then you need to speak out so that we can make it stop.

Who might it happen to?

It can happen to anyone at any time.

What signs should we look out for that someone might be the victim of child on child abuse?

You might see someone being unkind with their words or actions.

You might see someone crying or alone.

A friend might change their behaviour, suddenly being quiet or short tempered for no reason - try talking to them.

Someone might be avoiding going to school, or trying to avoid going out to play.

They might have bruises on them.



What should I do?

- S**taff
- A**dults
- F**riends
- E**veryone



If you see child on child abuse:

You could tell the child who is being unkind to stop.

Look after the victim, be a friend to them.

Encourage the victim to tell or offer to tell for them.

If we need to talk:

We can talk to any adult in school we trust and feel safe with.

We have worry boxes in our classroom if we want to let an adult know we need to talk to them quietly. But if you don't want to wait speak to someone straight away.
