News from the Early Years

The first half term is always a busy and important one in the EYFS. It is a first and memorable milestone. We are delighted to say that the children have settled into reception very quickly and are now used to the daily routines including Phase 2 Phonics, Maths, PE and eating their lunch in the big hall. We have spent time getting to know each other through our topic of 'Marvellous Me', making friends and developing our sense of identity as Inkpen class. Our first parent workshops have taken place and we look forward to more as the year progresses.

We are really proud of our pre-school children, they have settled in well and are exploring their new play spaces both indoors and outdoors. The children are making new friends and getting to know the adults that are caring for them.

As a whole EYFS we have been working on our topic of Autumn across both classes. The children have enjoyed Autumn walks, observing the changes in their environment and hunting for Autumn treasures such as conkers and acorns. In Reception we have learnt about Harvest and the habits of hedgehogs. Both classes have read lots of Autumn themed stories and learnt some Autumn facts too!

News from Year 1

What a start to the year it has been! So many of us in Donaldson class have taken the leap into Y1 with ease. We have got to experience playing on the KS1 playground, going to collective worship each morning and taking part in our church services with the rest of the school.

Our highlight this half term would definitely be making smoothies, the children loved taste-testing the fruits to decide what they would like to put in their smoothie and then making the smoothies using blenders and giving it a score out of ten. We had lots of 10/10s! Music was another exciting topic, we have been looking at finding the pulse of a piece of music as well as the rhythm and we thoroughly enjoyed exploring this through playing different percussion instruments.

We are extremely confident with our numbers to 10, we are able to count them, order them, identify which number is greater or less than and a whole lot more. The children have worked incredibly hard on their maths and should be very proud of themselves. We have also begun learning our phase 5 sounds in phonics and Donaldson class have completed their first ever phonics screening check the last couple of weeks too.

Science has also been lots of fun this half term learning about seasons, the children have completed art work to show the different seasons on a tree, they have performed and filmed weather forecasts to explain the different weather in each season and we have also made playdoh earths to understand day and night.

Writing has been our hardest challenge so far this year, the children have shown great resilience in our first topic; Little Red Riding Hood and we continue to practise constructing a simple sentence with capital letters, punctuation and finger spaces. We have also been working on on our letter formation too.

Year 1 have worked so hard throughout this long half term and deserve a good rest! Have a lovely week off and I look forward to the next half term full of lots of fun learning, our KS1 production and lots of exciting Christmas activities.





News from Year 2

Kerr class have had an exciting and learning filled half term. The children have really impressed us with their enthusiasm for topics and their ability to use ambitious, but accurate vocabulary in Science, Geography and Computing.

Our writing is improving with our work on Little Red Reading Hood, where we looked at dialogue, feelings and description. We then finished with some amazing independent writing, for an effective setting, using descriptive devices, such as similes, metaphors and the senses. Each week that goes by, has allowed us to be able to push and challenge them that little bit further!

In maths, we have completed our first unit on place value to 100 and are now looking at addition and subtraction skills within 100. (This will continue after half term.) We have challenged pupils with lots of problem-solving questions linked to these areas and the pupils are really enjoying having to think more deeply and find more than one answer to a question. They have shown us just how resilient and reflective they can be! We are also working hard to be able to explain our ideas and thought processes to our friends.

The children have enjoyed learning about the four countries that make up the United Kingdom and consider what we might do if we visited one of the capital cities. Similarities and differences have been compared and we have used compass directions to describe how to get from one to another.

We enjoyed working in house teams earlier this term to create poppies ready for our remembrance service and loved our science day where we learned about 'Journeys' of germs, in our 'Sneeze Zone' and 'Spreading Germs' experiments. We also tested paper helicopters and aeroplanes, to learn about gravity and air resistance.

In art, we have been creating artwork from maps, using collage and colour. We finally created a stained-glass window of a section of our map to school.

We are excited to continue into the next half term with our class and build on their academic knowledge and skills, as well as their personal skills. We will particularly be thinking about how our words and actions impact others. If you have any stories at home that link with this, please feel free to bring them in, so that we can share and talk about them. Wishing you all a lovely half term!

News from Year 3

It has been a fun-packed first half-term in Dahl Class and the children have settled beautifully. In History, they have been learning all about the 'Shang Dynasty'. A firm favourite by all was learning about Fu Hao and her tomb especially what was found inside it! The children finished the unit by answering our big question – 'What do we know about the Shang Dynasty?' Some amazing extended pieces of writing Year 3 – be proud!

In English, the children have completed two units. They started with a class favourite 'George's Marvellous Medicine'. The children independently wrote some fantastic character descriptions of George

from Gran's perspective – well done. They then moved on to a non-chronological report - 'Skeletons and Muscles.' As a whole class, they researched the scaly, armoured pangolin. There have been many smiley faces in Dahl Class writing about this interesting mammal! When they return, the children will be writing their own non-chronological report on an animal of their choice!

The children have love, love, loved starting French in Year 3. They have enjoyed greeting me in the morning with a 'salut' or 'bonjour'. They have also enjoyed asking me how I am (ça va?) and telling me how they are feeling – excellente!

In maths, the children have been consolidating their knowledge of place value within 100 to support them with place value within 1,000. They have used varied manipulatives such as base 10 and place value counters to support their understanding. They are currently halfway through a unit on addition and subtraction and will continue this unit after the half-term.

Enjoy a well-earned rest Dahl Class, you have worked your socks off – be proud!

News from Year 4

We have had a jam-packed first (almost) 8 weeks in Year 4! We have completed two independent writing pieces – one narrative based on the Disney short 'Feast' and a setting description of an ancient woodland. We have challenged ourselves by including fronted adverbials, a new skill we have learnt in year 4. We have been reading 'The Boy at the Back of the Class' by Onjali Rauf. The children have enjoyed reading, comprehending the story and expressing their understanding of a topic they are learning more about.

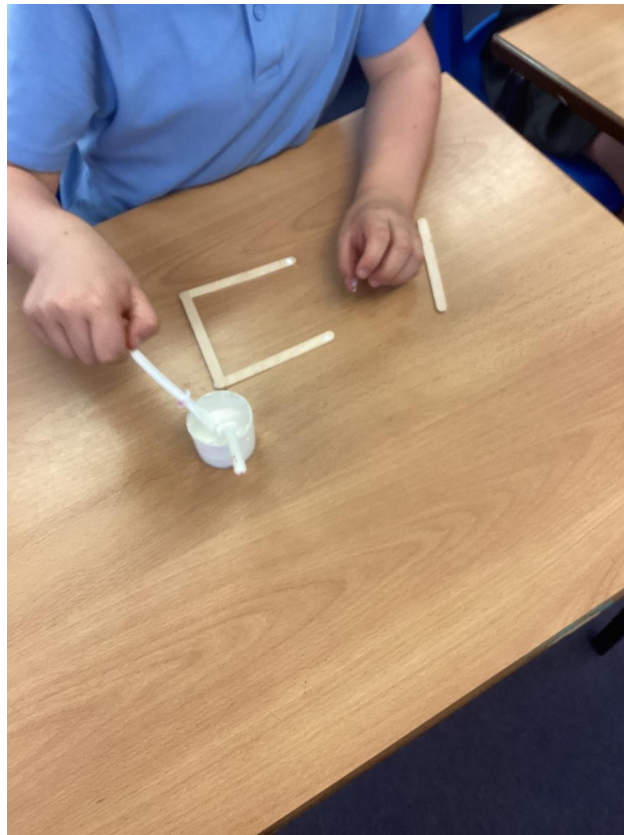
Our maths learning as developed on our prior knowledge – we have explored place value of numbers in the thousands, introduced the concept of rounding and discussed how we can use it to check our answers and learnt to add and subtract 4-digit numbers using the column method with multiple exchanges! We have been focused on recalling our 3 times table this half term, which we will then develop as our maths focus shifts to learning our 6, 7-, 9-, 11- and 12-times tables!

Our science topic has focused on animals including humans, we've learnt all about the digestive system – which links to our current English topic, learnt the function of our different types of teeth and explored food chains – understanding the different between a producer, prey and a predator. Our History topic has introduced us to the Romans and we've learnt about the impact they had on Britain and the changes they left behind.

We worked on our resilience through our DT topic this half term whilst making our slingshot cars. We found parts of this tricky but through problem-solving and reciprocity we managed to all complete a car.

We started by designing our own car, thinking about the different planes of the car and we spoke about air resistance to understand why some cars are faster than others. We then got to make the chassis of the car. This involved creating two axels for our wheels and attaching them to the main frame. It was important that we did not glue the straws to the axel otherwise the wheels would not turn. Our music this half term as focused around 'motifs' – a short repeating pattern. We have identified them in pieces of music, practiced a given motif and composed our own.

It has been a really busy half term but Morpurgo Class have settled in well. They are building on their resilience and perseverance and have adapted to the pace of learning. We look forward to the learning, projects and challenges of next term. Well done Year 4!





News from Year 5

Rowling class have made a brilliant start to the new academic year! The transition into upper key stage two cannot be underestimated, each and every child has already developed their independence, resilience and knowledge this half term.

Our English and guided reading this half term have been designed around the narrative 'The Explorer', the class have thoroughly enjoyed becoming immersed within this text and have written their own fantastic setting descriptions inspired by this text. Within maths, our learning has moved from strength

to strength with pupils growing in confidence and fluency skills. Learning has included recapping place value knowledge (building up to numbers over a million) and further developing our addition and subtraction skills with increasingly large numbers.

Rowling class have also been fascinated when learning about the major biomes across our planet and can now identify these based on their characteristics, providing reasoning for why these may now be at risk. P.E. learning has focussed on hand-eye coordination and ball striking linked to tennis, pupils have made excellent progress in this area. We have also been working hard as linguists, using our learning from previous years to support us in writing at greater lengths using adjectives accurately- it was amazing to see the pupils applying their new understanding and vocabulary accurately when completing their first piece of extended writing in another language.

The highlight of the half term for many pupils was our incredible residential to the Isle of Wight- at Eynesbury we are so proud of the many opportunities we offer our pupils, for many of the children, this was their first time on a boat, visiting an island and even stepping foot on a beach! This was an amazing experience for so many of the children, with highlights including a visit to Blackgang Chine, Alum Bay and seeing amazing animals at the monkey haven. Every child should be proud of their attitude and growth during this week- representing team Eynesbury brilliantly and making all staff members attending the residential proud!

Well done to every member of Rowling class for their individual and collective achievements this half term, we look forward to the upcoming challenges after a well-deserved break!



News from Year 6

This half term, Pullman have been busy learning and settling into Year 6. In our PD lessons we have been learning about rules, rights and responsibilities and how this affects our daily lives. We have focused on and reviewed our rules in school and have learnt about how our democratic country is run. We also wrote manifestos for the school councillor role.

Our science topic about the circulatory system has helped us to learn about how our bodies function. We have learnt about how the blood flows around our body, its function, the function of the heart and we have even dissected a heart to see the chambers in the flesh. We were amazed at the size of the heart and we found the ligaments fascinating.

In English, we have written an example of a bildungsroman based on 'The Graveyard Book' by Neil Gaiman, a balanced argument based on 'Wonder' by R.J.Palacio and a setting description. As always, we have been focusing on the Year 6 expectations for writing, including the use of punctuation in directed speech and we have focused on adding description using showing not telling sentences.

Our maths topics have covered place value and the four operations. We have shown resilience by mastering written methods to calculate large numbers. We have also focused on how to be efficient calculators, discussing efficient and accurate mental methods we could use to increase our calculating.

Other subjects have included learning around globalisation and how communication and the internet has improved this; internet safety, including how to behave appropriately online and how to communicate safely online; healthy living, including the effects of exercise on our bodies and the types of food needed for a healthy diet; and we focused on making our voices heard using different art forms. We also enjoyed our space themed science day.

It has been a busy term but Pullman Class have settled into the stride of Year 6. They are building on their resilience and perseverance and have adapted to the pace of learning. We look forward to the learning, projects and challenges of next term and, of course, we are looking forward to Hilltop.

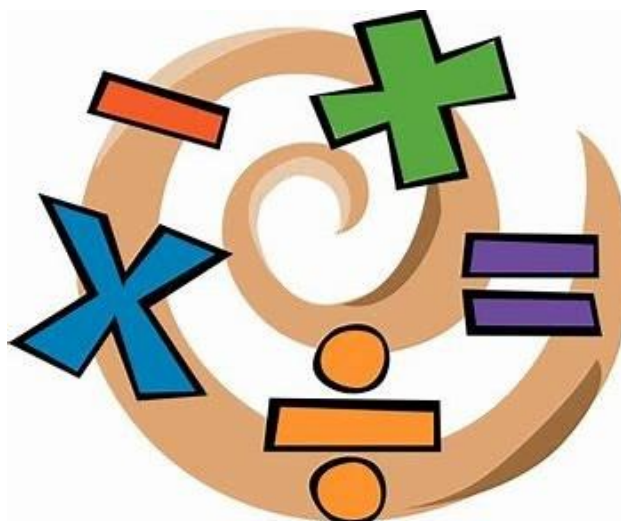
